Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species of Wild Animals (CMS)

- UN Environment treaty
- Only global legal instrument for conservation of migratory species of wild animals
- >1000 species of avian, aquatic and terrestrial fauna
- Species that cyclically and predictably cross one or more national jurisdictional boundaries

- Strict protection







Map of 126 Parties (as of 1 December 2017)









Non-Party participating in Agreement or MOU





Illegal Killing of Birds (IKB)

Overexploitation, including **illegal killing, taking and trade**, is one of the main drivers of bird extinctions globally, and is the **second most significant threat** (after habitat loss) to migratory birds.

The Prevention of Illegal Killing, Taking and Trade of Migratory Birds

Clear need of enhanced international cooperation and support to countries towards effective law enforcement responses

Bonn Convention text:



- Parties that are Range States of a migratory species listed in Appendix I shall **prohibit the taking of animals** belonging to such species. Exceptions might be made and reported to the Secretariat.
- Each Agreement should prepare for procedures for coordinating action to suppress illegal taking

CMS Resolution 11.16 (Rev. COP 12)

"Illegal killing, taking and trade of migratory **birds** still represent important factors against the achievement and maintenance of the favourable conservation status of bird populations in all major flyways, negatively affecting conservation actions undertaken by States and resulting in adverse impacts on the conservation, legal hunting, agriculture and tourism sectors"

Task Force: MIKT

Resolution 11.16 calls on the Secretariat to convene an Intergovernmental Lask Force to Address Illegal Killing, Taking and Trade in the Mediterranean (MIKT) in conjunction with Secretariats of AEWA, the Raptors MoU, the African-Eurasian Migratory Landbirds Action Plan and the Bern Convention.

MIKT's role


- facilitate concerted efforts and procedures to combat illegal killing, taking and trade of migratory birds in the Mediterranean Region;

Scoreboard to assess the progress in combating illegal killing, taking and trade of wild birds (IKB)

A self-assessment framework for national use

 provides national governments with a tool to provide an objective, fact-based national self-assessment of the current status of illegal killing of birds at national level

Report of the Workshop – some key messages

- Specialist prosecutors greatly enhance the fight against IKB
- **Specialized police forces**, adequately trained/equipped and work on the ground, greatly increases success
- National commitment by the relevant governmental ministries and departments, with underpinning of modern and effective legislation
- International cooperation
- Intensification of international cooperation beyond the European network
- MIKT can play a vital role as a platform for international cooperation

Working to eradicate IKB

Important decisions

- On **21st June 2018**, the European Court of Justice (ECJ) delivered a judgement concluding that Malta was found **guilty of infringing the European Birds Directive** when it allowed finch trapping to reopen in 2014.
- The ECJ clearly stated that by adopting a derogation allowing the trapping of seven species of wild finch, Malta has failed to fulfill its obligations under EU law.
